Thank Yous & Tips





Ladies of Harley Bake Sale: I just wanted to thank all of you that were part of the bake sale. The ladies did finish next to the last, and the men of Chapter finished second.

Demo Rides: I want thank all of you that helped with demo rides Friday, September 13 and Saturday, September 14. We had about 130 registrants and 338 rides. This was the best one yet.

Stopping: One thing that can trip you up when you're stopped is poor footing. Stop signs and lights are often the site of a slick spot in the road, especially when it's wet. Take care not to put your foot down on an oil slick, only to have it slip out from underneath you, with you and your bike hitting the ground as a result.

What is a Puck: Many wise and experienced riders carry some form of a parking "puck" with them at all times for situations where the parking surface is too soft to support the weight of their motorcycle on its side stand. Pucks can be used on a dirt or gravel parking lot, a grass field, or an asphalt lot on a hot day. The idea is to spread the motorcycle's weight over a wider area in order to prevent the side stand from sinking into the parking surface. This can be accomplished in many ways:

Commercial pucks made of plastic or other stiff material are readily available and inexpensive. You can purchase one at Dallas Harley-Davidson. A small square of plywood will also do. A number of other things will do in a pinch. A flattened aluminum beverage can is a common puck substitute. A flat rock, or even stick, will often do. The key is just to get something hard, flat, and stable underneath the side stand to prevent sinkage.

Parking: An important consideration when parking is the slope of the parking surface. One common mistake is pulling into a parking space only to realize that you're incapable of pushing your bike backwards up the slope you didn't realize you parked on. If the spot is sloped away from you, swing around and back your bike in. That way, you'll have the power of your bike's v-twin engine instead of just your leg power to get you back up that little hill.

Slopes also matter when they tilt sideways. If the ground to the left of your motorcycle is lower than to the right, it may result in too much lean to keep your bike upright. You may be better off backing in to keep the side stand on the high side. Take care not to leave your bike so vertical that a gentle breeze could knock it over. If the slope is too steep to park safely either way, find another spot.

Suggest a Location, Eat for Free

reetings and welcome to you from the Duck Pond. Well, I am just sitting here looking over our upcoming ride calendar and seeing that we have some new ride destinations being planned. It got me to thinking that, with so many new members joining us on each ride, I bet they could be a potential source for new ride destinations and, of course, some new ideas for places to eat that the Chapter would enjoy.

So, I wanted to invite the membership to offer us some new ideas. Did you know that if you recommend an eating establishment that we, as a chapter, have not been to before, and if you accompany us there, we will buy your meal as a thank you from us? It is very simple. This is what we need to know.

Since we have two different types of rides, Thursday night dinner rides and longer weekend rides, location is important to consider. We try to keep our Thursday night dinner rides to locations that are within a 30 to 45 minute ride from the dealership so we can get there rather quickly and eat. As these rides are usually our largest — anywhere from 25 to up to 65 members and families — these locations need to be able to seat and serve a large-sized group. These are very important considerations to keep in mind for this type of ride.

Our weekend rides are usually, but not always, a little smaller with up to 30 members on the high side. While we might be willing to ride up to four or five hours to arrive at an eating establishment on a weekend, that usually is a pretty good limit to keep in mind. Again, ask yourself: Is there enough seating for a group to be able to get a table? And, how much will we

overpower the cook and wait staff?

If you find a location you want us to visit, one other thing you could do to help is to ask the manager if they would be interested in having us bring them some business. Not every restaurant has been interested in having us as customers, so if you ask them up front, then it saves some wasted time for us later when we go on a pre-ride visit and find that they would prefer not to have us come by. It happens.

Next, what you need to do is contact James Pate, our Head Road Captain, with the details (see page 21 for contact information). He will put it out to the other officers to see who might like to lead a ride to your suggested location. It may take two to three months before we can get it on the calendar, so patience is also necessary. But, we do work to try to make a ride to places that are suggested to us.

At this point, the Road Captain puts together a route, visits the location, and gets it on the calendar. What you need to do is come on the ride with us. If you do, then we will purchase your single meal and drink (alcohol not included) up to \$20.00. Just give the ride leader your receipt, and he will get you reimbursed by our Treasurer, Wendy Yeater.

We like all kinds of food, and if it's good, we want to go there and eat. So, be on the lookout for new locations. Remember, some of us have been riding with the Chapter for over fourteen years, and we need some new ideas from you on new establishments to visit.

I look forward to getting to visit with you at our next get together...





Do You Need That Tuner?

ew technology keeps finding its way into our beloved motorcycles, so we too must educate ourselves of its function. With that, I'd like to explain some of the features and benefits of the Harley-Davidson Screamin' Eagle Pro Super Tuner.

I get asked all too often, "Do I really need that?" or "Can I just change my exhaust without buying that tuner?"

Allow me to help you make an informed decision. I will use the most common scenario as my example: exhaust on a 2007 or newer model.

Our motorcycles' fuel injection system has a delicate balance of air to fuel giving the engine that perfect cocktail to ensure it runs smoothly and optimally. When we begin to modify that delicate balance, we need a way to bring back that optimal level.

From the factory, the air to fuel ratio is slightly on the lean side (more air than fuel). This is great for emissions, but makes the motorcycle a bit on the hot side of things. In Texas, we do not want things any hotter than they already are, and I am thankful that our motorcycles do not have stringent emissions control laws (these changes are not going to ruin are lovely North Texas air).

The 2007 and newer Harley-Davidson models are all equipped with fuel injection that has an adaptive fuel valve. What this means in theory is that we can make small changes to the intake or exhaust system, and the bike will make small changes to compensate. This is never a 100% certainty,

and you leave yourself open to potential trouble later on. Making those changes can cause the bike to run even leaner causing more heat along with physical symptoms of running poorly (spitting, sputtering), or exhaust "blueing" or discoloration due to the extra heat.

This is where the Super Tuner shines. The Super Tuner allows our technicians to make many changes to the fuel injection system, bringing that balance of air to fuel back to an optimal level. The Super Tuner has a mode called "Smart Tune" which allows the technician to record data while riding the bike, getting real road information. In short, after all the changes are made to the bike (intake, exhaust, performance mods), the tech will take a trip around the neighborhood on side streets, the highway, school zones, and will even hot rod it a little (my favorite). During the entire test ride, the Super Tuner gathers information from various sources on the motorcycle and uses it to build an optimal tune. Once this is completed, the Super Tuner does not stay connected to the bike so there is no worry for loose connections or damage at a future time.

If you decide you want to make more changes, you can reuse your Super Tuner as many times as you want (It knows your VIN; So sorry, no sharing).

Visit me anytime at the dealership, and I can go over the finer details of the many changes the Screamin' Eagle Pro Super Tuner

The Beginnings Of a Legend

hat is the greatest model Harley-Davidson ever produced? That is a question that, if asked to 100 different riders, would likely return almost

as many different answer. What isn't disputable is that there are some models that just stand out as legends

above the others: the 1909 5D, the first production v-twin; WLA the 1940s "Liberator," which captured the heart of Europe during World War Two; or even the more recent Fat Boy, which is so iconic that even people that don't ride can point them out as being a Harley. The 2014 Tri-Glide will likely join that great pantheon as the next in a long line of legendary motorcycles.

"Revolutionary"

isn't a word normally associated with Trikes. In the past, most people that purchased trikes, even those that are the most passionate about them, did so for practical reasons. The new Tri-Glide changes all of that. For quite possibly the first time ever, Harley-Davidson has produced a Trike that is so stunningly beautiful and so far ahead of the curve, that people who would never have considered going three-wheel are going to flock to this scooter.

There are so many great technological leaps

incorporated into this machine that it would almost be easier to discuss the few features that weren't changed — three wheels and a smooth ride. The fairing, saddlebags, and tour pack were all streamlined to give the bike a sleeker look and better ride. The 103 cubic-inch engine was redesigned so that not only is it producing around 7% more power than previous models, it also runs cooler

> and more efficient. The headlight has been converted to a Daymaker LED, which gives the rider better nighttime visibility and has the added benefit of making trike more visible itself. Last, but most definitely not least, the new infotainment system puts a wealth of resources information right at the rider's fingertips in a nice, easy-tonavigate package.

This Trike represents the next great step forward for Harley-Davidson. In 10 years, people will look back on this model and point to it as the beginning of a revolution in what we come to expect from a motorcycle. Much like the other greats that proceeded it, this Trike is destined to become a legend.

What Did You Do This Summer?

year marks the 110th anniversary of Harley-Davidson, and it is also the 30th anniversary of the Harley Owners Group, better known as H.O.G. Every five years, Harley-Davidson hosts a very large rally in Milwaukee, Wisconsin in celebration of their anniversary. Who got to go this year? Lisa and I did!

Word of advice: If you plan on attending the 115th anniversary, plan on making it a two-day trip. It's a long story. I'll tell you later.

Lisa and I attended the rally for two reasons. One, we had never been and wanted to go. Two, as many of you know, I — along with about fifteen other H.O.G. members from other groups, Ken Rideout, Dennis McBride from Dallas H.O.G., and others from Panther Creek and Fort Worth H.O.G. — participate in motorcycle skills riding competitions, or sometimes known as motorcycle rodeos. Well, this year was the first year that Harley-Davidson sponsored a civilian motorcycle rodeo. I will tell you more about that in a minute, but first, back to the rally.

So what can I say about the 110th anniversary of Harley-Davidson in Milwaukee? Hmmm, let's see. It was freakin' awesome! Now, granted, it just so happened that Milwaukee decided to have their record heat for the year. Oh well, we are from Texas. We're

not afraid of a little heat.

The rally began on Thursday, August 29, and it was held at the Summer Fest Grounds in Milwaukee. Lisa and I left the hotel, went and had breakfast, and arrived at Summer Fest around 9:00 a.m. There were motorcycles as far as the eye could see, and more were still showing up. We saw riders from all over the world. There were riders from Canada, Mexico, Brazil, Australia, and Italy. Shoot, I can't name them all. There were riders from all over the country. Even with all of those people in one place at the same time, everyone was very friendly and courteous.

Speaking of friendly, the people in Milwaukee and the surrounding cities were very friendly. Everywhere we went, everyone was very friendly. I remember at one restaurant, at least four people came to our table to welcome us to Milwaukee and said they hope we have fun and asked us to be safe.

There were vendors outside and inside of the rally. Each night, there were live bands that played on three different stages for all to see. Lisa and I watched Lynard Skynard, Joan Jett, Brett Michaels, and the Doobie Brothers. How cool is that?

The top 30 civilian competitors from Wednesday's competition was competing there on Thursday and the motor officers were competing there on Friday and Saturday. Again, I'll get back to that in a minute.



Saturday was the parade. Since I competed in the skills riding competition, Lisa and I were able to ride in the parade. That was unbelievable. The parade must have been at least five miles long. I can't tell you the number of motorcycles that was in the parade. The number of people that came out to watch the parade was amazing. For a little while, we all felt like rock stars; We felt like celebrities. People were waving and clapping and high-fiving us. The times we had to stop, everyone wanted us to rev our engines so they could hear the roar. One person handed Lisa a bottle of water. Did I mention that Milwaukee had their record heat that week? The rally was great! I am already making plans to go back for the 115th anniversary. Maybe I will see you there.

Oh, I bet you thought I forgot, huh? I am sure that many of you are familiar with what is known as bike games. These are games that are held at many H.O.G. rallies and H.O.G.-sponsored events. Normally, for riding two-up, the objective is for the passenger to do something like taking tennis balls off of a set of cones and then putting them back on, or picking up stuffed animals. The whole time the rider has to move slow enough so the passenger can do their job without the rider putting their feet down. The bike games are fun. Lisa and I enjoy playing in them.

Skills riding — motorcycle rodeos — are completely different. They are designed to push the rider and the motorcycle to their limits, while maintaining full control. This is something that we practice several days a week from three to six hours at a time. We do this for two reasons. One, it helps to make us better riders, where we learn to control the motorcycle and it doesn't control us. Two, we love to compete.

Harley-Davidson has allowed motorcycle rodeos to take place at H.O.G. State Rallies, but just as a side event and never really sponsored them. Well, it looks like that may be changing. This year at the 30th anniversary of H.O.G., Harley-Davidson sponsored the very first civilian motorcycle rodeo, and I am happy to say that I was one of the first to compete in the inaugural event.

Prior to the competition, 85 riders had registered to compete. Many, it turned out, thought the event was going to be bike games. Nathan Boyd, a Harley-Davidson employee, event coordinator, and skills rider





competitor convinced Harley-Davidson to sponsor the competition. Nathan realized, after receiving several emails, that a lot of registrants thought it was a series of bike games. So 15 of them dropped out, leaving 70 competitors. Later 10 more dropped out, and we ended up with 60 competitors, many of which are some of the best riders in the country. Many of these riders, ride as good or better than many motor officers do.

So, how did Texas do? Seven of the Texas Team made it to the top 30 to compete in the big show on Thursday at the rally, and three of them made the top 10 in the Thursday event. Kevin Meadows from Panther Creek won First-Place. Kevin Briggs from Fort Worth won Second-Place, and Steve Fowler from Panther Creek placed Seventh.

We have a bike practice every Monday evening at 6:30 p.m in the old Target parking lot behind the shop. Come on out and play in the cones with us. Who knows, maybe you will be competing with the Texas Team at the 115th anniversary. If not, let's just have some fun in the cones.
